Why pick a food drive?



- Community Support is the primary source of donations
- Food insecurity levels are the highest they have been in years due to the Coronavirus pandemic
- Students in higher education have higher risks of food insecurity
- On-campus food resources are easy and affordable options



The Literature is Clear



- There is a huge stigma against the use of food pantries
- Food pantries serve more than emergency food needs including:
 - ◆ Nutrient rich foods
 - Dairy
 - Vegetables
 - Fruits
- Lack of food variety and dietary restrictions correlate to lower academic performance.
- There is an intense need for resources but there is a lack of sources of food.

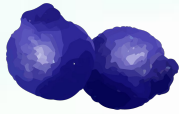
